

As Parishioners may have seen in the local press the Neighbourhood Plan Referendum took place on the 17th August with resounding positive support from the Electorate.

On a turnout of 38%, 221 votes were cast, 203 in favour and 18 against - ie a 92% "Yes" vote.

The Parish Council and its Neighbourhood Plan Group are grateful and take the opportunity to thank all those Parishioners who voted, either in person or by post/proxy and who responded to the various surveys and attended Public Meetings during the course of the plan's preparation. We are also grateful to those Parishioners who volunteered their assistance in the early stages of the Neighbourhood Plan, whether or not you were called upon to help.

The Plan has now been adopted by Cheshire East Council and will have equal status to the Local Plan in determining Planning Policy and applications in the Parishes between now and 2030.



Astbury School News

We hope you enjoy reading the news from our school and that you can learn something about us as you read! The school year started in church as we held our annual welcome service to welcome all the new children and staff. We love the village of Astbury and children in years five and six are taking part in a souling project. They have thought about all the things that they love in the village and are writing a folk song about them. Learning the song and adding some musical accompaniment, supported by two composers who are leading the project, is exciting.

Secrets of Success This half term we are continuing to learn how to be successful. Our focus is 'try new things'. The children have been trying many new things and their attitudes and approaches to learning have been improving as they learn how to be a successful learner. In worship, the year six children led their team in discussion about the new things children have tried that were successful. This discussion followed on from learning about Ruth in the Old Testament, she went to a new country and tried many new things. God honoured her faithfulness and she became the great grandmother to King David, in the family line of Jesus.



Standon Bowers Many children from years three and four have been away on their residential to Standon Bowers. This was a fantastic opportunity to build friendships, try new things and have fun together. The first challenge was to put a pillow and duvet inside their covers and make their bed! Amongst other challenges were caving, bouldering, team building and low ropes. The children had an amazing time, Arthur said it was 'stupendous!' The staff were really proud of all the children who overcame their fears and were resilient, not giving up and trying to complete tasks. The staff at Standon Bowers gave our children many compliments on their exemplary behaviour, especially in the dinner hall.

Gist lorry The children were excited to see the cab from a lorry in the playground when they arrived at school. Tracy and Paul from Gist gave an interactive presentation to the children and took them outside in smaller groups to learn about road safety and be reminded about how to stay safe. They played a great game called 'hide the children' as the teacher sat in the driver's seat and the children stood in front of the cab. They managed to hide a whole class and the children learned an important safety message about the visibility of the driver in a lorry. The children also estimated how far it would take the lorry to stop at 30mph. There were cones out on the playground and they learnt that it would take 25m. Each child was able to ask questions and many climbed into the cab and tried out the springy seat and bed!

In Memory of
Private

Ernest Henry Davenport

49478, 1st/6th Bn., Cheshire Regiment who died on 20 September 1917 Age 26

Son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Davenport, of 29, Lion St., Congleton, Cheshire.

Remembered with Honour
Tyne Cot Memorial

Beginning on the 31st July 1917 and ending on 10th. November 1917, the Third Battle of Ypres comprised of 8 phases. Sadly **Ernest Henry Davenport**, Private 49478 of the 1st/6th Battalion Cheshire Regiment was never found after the terrible bombardment of the 3rd Phase, known as The Battle of Menin Road Bridge. His war record states "Missing on or since Thursday 20/9/1917, presumed dead." How his parents felt when they received this news cannot be imagined.

Ernest Henry was one of twelve children born to Joel and Florence Davenport. Joel was living with his parents Henry (born in Astbury 1833 and Mary born in Odd Rode 1833) at Boarded Barn on the 1891 census, prior to his marriage to Florence Stonehewer at Odd Rode Church on 29th July 1891. He was a labourer of Odd Rode, she was a spinster of Odd Rode. Five months later they were back in the church for Ernest's baptism on December 30th. 1891! There followed Amelia (1892), Joel (1894- died 1895), Harriet (1896), Miriam Ethel (1898), George (1900), Beatrice (1903), Horace (1905), Joel (1907), Allen (1909), Ada Ellen (1910) and Annie Elizabeth (1913). The family were living at **Boarded Barn** near Little Moreton Hall on the 1901 census (when Joel is an agricultural labourer and Ernest is a schoolboy), spent some time in the Potteries between 1901 and 1911, when the census shows them living on Spring Bank, Scholar Green. Joel is now a general labourer at a chemical works. Ernest Henry is away from home and is a cattle labourer working on a dairy farm run by a Will Kirkham at Scholar Green. No papers have survived to show when and where he joined up, or where he was living when he attested. (he must have been in Moreton cum Alcumlow or Newbold Astbury) After his death any payments or monies owed to him were forwarded to his mother Florence, then residing at 29, Lion Street, Congleton. His mother passed away in 1938 aged 68, and his father Joel was still living at 29 Lion Street at the outbreak of the Second World War, in 1939 and he sadly passed away in 1944 aged 78.
