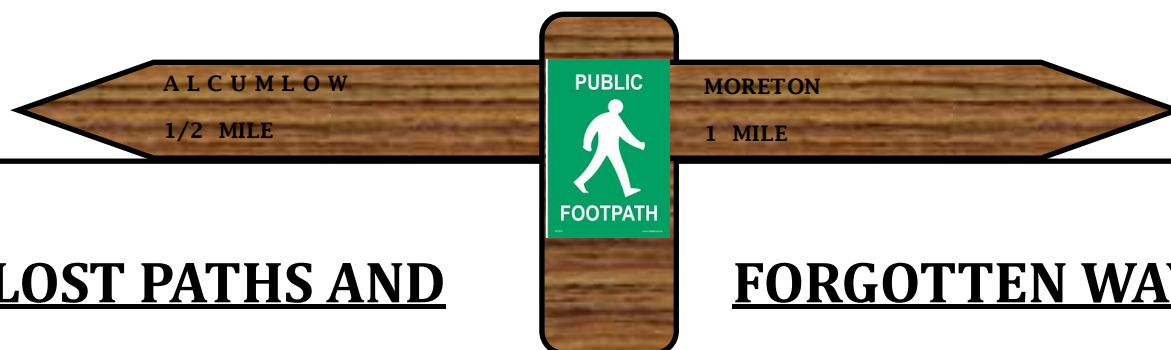
Many Parish businesses have been seriously affected by the lockdown and residents are encouraged to support the local economy as things return to the "new normal".

## LOST PATHS AND

## FORGOTTEN WAYS

DO YOU REMEMBER that there was once a footpath in Astbury or Moreton parish - but it is not there any longer? If you do, the Parish Council wants to hear from you. This is because unless we claim these paths before January 2026 the right to do so will be extinguished, according to the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 (CROW).

Cheshire East has an interactive map on its website, and you can check if the footpath or route that you used to walk is on it. If it isn't, the PC wants to look into claiming it as a footpath.

How is that done? Proof is documentary, such as old maps, and/or personal - statements from people. Local knowledge that goes back a few years would be useful here. The paths must have existed before 1949 - a previous Countryside Act - but old maps can help prove their existence before that date.

Some Parish Councillors already know some footpaths that have disappeared and have old maps to support their case, as well as personal testimony. We want to hear from YOU to help to verify any paths you know about.

The impetus to do this work has come from appeals by the Ramblers, who are also doing work on it throughout the country, which is a huge job, and we are liaising with them. There is useful information on their website, and on that of the Peak and Northern Footpaths Society.

We as a PC know that the countryside is under a lot of pressure now from increased use. This Act aims to give final certainty to landowners and the public as to what footpaths there are. Landowners can make a Declaration about the footpaths on their land by an application to the PROW section of Cheshire East. It can take years to get these applications considered so we need to start now!

### A message from our new Rector Revd. Anne-Marie Naylor.

"I am looking around me in wonder at being in such a beautiful place. A famous Jesuit priest called Gerry Hughes once wrote a book called "God of Surprises". Nobody was more surprised than me when God called to be a parish priest - in fact the idea seemed so ridiculous that I pushed it away for years. Callings have a way of being insistent! 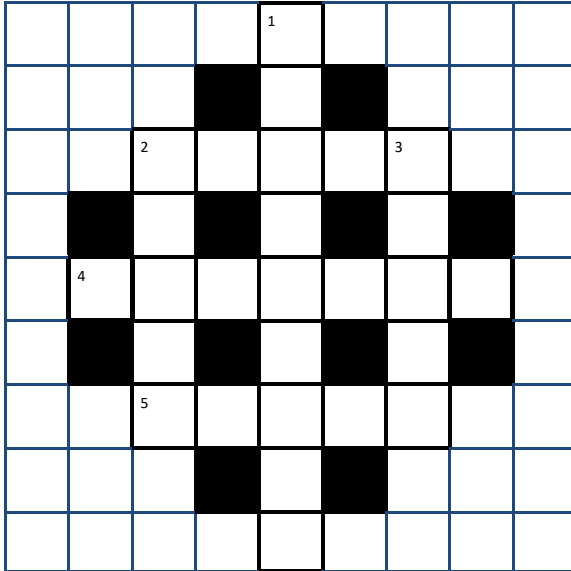

## ASTBURY ROLL OF HONOUR

**John Edward CARTLIDGE and James Gordon CARTLIDGE** were 2 of the 7 children born to Edward and Emma Cartlidge (nee Gordon, married at St. Stephen's 1879). John was born 26/11/1882 and baptised at St. Stephen's 25/3/1883. James was born 7/2/1887 and baptised at the same church 17/2/1887. At that time their father was a collier and they were living in Congleton.

In 1901 the family are living in Astbury. Edward is now the church sexton, John is a wheelwright and James is at school. Edward and his family are still living in Astbury village where Edward is still the sexton. James is aged 24 and a bricklayer. Meanwhile John was now a Divinity student, living in Bournemouth.

No service records seem to have survived for them. The only other info is that in 1939 John was married and the Vicar of the C of E church in Oakengates, Shropshire. He died in 1976. James was living in Astbury a bricklayer again, married to Mary E (Withers) with 3 (?) children. He died on 9/9/1957 and was buried at Astbury on 15/9/57. Can anybody help? Again, please contact us if you have any information.

**Frank BAILEY** is missing records too. There is a Frank Bailey son of Charles, a miner, and Frances, born 1897. Frank is living on Mow Lane, Newbold Astbury on both the 1901 and 1911 censuses, where his mother is a widow.

**John BROWN** is also mentioned on the Roll of Honour, but as you can imagine, this name is just about impossible to research, so if anybody out there knows who this John Brown was, please contact us!
